reat to see you! Come and join us as we discover a different side to Stuttgart, turning city districts into our favourite quarters. Are you in? Then let's go south!

We begin our stroll in the Gerberviertel. Although part of the central Mitte district, it reaches out to the south of the city. The two are linked by hip and trendy Tübinger Strasse. We head past the city's oldest cinema, vintage shops, and laid-back cafés and restaurants to reach popular Marienplatz square. People at the outdoor tables are enjoying the sun as they watch the 'Zacke' cog railway trundle past.

But let's explore the district properly, starting with Südheim and Heslach. Or have you got your mind on higher things? Karlshöhe hill – once a quarry, now a romantic park – offers picture-postcard vistas. There are a lot of those in the south of the city. Let your gaze sweep across the breweries and brickwork of Stuttgart as you stroll along panoramic trails past orchards, woods and vineyards.

Straddling the boundary between the city centre and the south, the Heusteigviertel and Lehen quarters offer the best of both worlds. The close proximity of the city centre, the lovely 1870s architecture, and the cafés and studios make the area popular with families and creative people. Wherever you end up, make yourself at home and enjoy your new favourite quarter.



Unmissable! Southwards

Heavenly Heslach! Captivating Karlshöhe!

What's on offer: hunting for second-hand bargains on Tübinger Strasse. Sipping spritzers on Marienplatz. Sunbathing on Karlshöhe hill. Playing boules on Erwin-Schoettle-Platz. Sounds like fun, doesn't it! So let's head south.



Hip hangout: Marienplatz

This is where the royal city of Stuttgart merged with the wine-growing village of Heslach in the 19th century. Nowadays, everyone from around here meets on Marienplatz square, where the pavement cafés in front of the Kaiserbau have a very relaxed vibe. People get together for a coffee or a drink after work and watch the cog railway carry its passengers to lofty heights.



Boules arena: Erwin-Schoettle-Platz

Older folks are playing boules as the tram rattles past in the background. Quite unlike its companion, bustling Marienplatz, Erwin-Schoettle-Platz is the leisurely heart of Heslach. The square is dominated by St Matthew's Church and the old fire station with its half-timbered tower.



Living the high life: Karlshöhe

Vineyard, quarry, park. Karlshöhe hill has been many things in its time and stretches far into the southern part of Stuttgart. The panoramic views from up here are amazing, and the Tschechen & Söhne beer garden is a fine place to enjoy them from dawn till dusk.



Something for everyone: Tübinger Strasse

This is the perfect place to dine, party, shop, skate, live and go to (St Mary's) church. Tübinger Strasse doesn't just link the city centre to the south, the trendy thoroughfare also boasts vintage shops, bars, galleries, family-run breweries, a venerable cinema and a shopping centre.

New heights

Much-loved conveyances and genuine rarities: Stuttgart is home to the world's first fully-automated cable car and the 'Zacke', one of only four remaining cog railways in Germany. All aboard, we're heading for the top.



The last of its kind: the 'Zacke'

Effortlessly climbing 205 metres on every journey, the cog railway has been rattling up Alte Weinsteige to Degerloch, past gardens and fabulous vistas, since 1884. Once upon a time it carried workers from the Filder plains and was used to transport goods to the city's markets.

Riding high: the cable car

With its polished brass, teak and mahogany, the cable car gleams just like it did at its launch in 1929. En route to Waldfriedhof cemetery, the funicular railway has to cope with inclines of up to 28 per cent. It owes its nickname, the Widows' Express, to its final destination.

TIPS

Two journeys, one tour

Take the cable car up to Degerloch. Follow the Blaustrümpflerweg trail for a walk through Dornhaldenwald forest. Then travel down to Marienplatz square on the 'Zacke'.

On your bike

The 'Zacke' has a special trailer for transporting bicycles free of charge. Great news for mountain bikers: they can ride the train to the top and whizz down the Woodpecker trail (p. 18).



The Moai the merrier!

Take the 'Zacke' to Haigst station, where Santiago-de-Chile-Platz offers lovely views into the valley. The small square is watched over by a moai, a sculpture from Easter Island.

Wonderful walks


Sequoia trees and vineyards are just some of the many attractions you'll encounter as you explore the circular walks and panoramic trails in Stuttgart's south. But what's the deal with the red and blue socks?

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A breath of fresh air on Schimmelhüttenweg

Only a stone's throw from Erwin-Schoettle-Platz, the Schimmelhüttenweg trail leads straight into Scharrenberg vineyard. Here, heritage-listed dry-stone walls and ancient cliffs give way to amazing views of Heslach Valley.



The 7.5km Blaustrümpflerweg (blue stocking trail) features a host of highlights, from Karlshöhe hill and Blauer Weg path to trips in the cable car and on the cog railway. High above the surrounding area, you stroll past orchards and wildflower meadows as you look down on the breweries and brickwork of Stuttgart.





Make your descent on Rote-Socken-Weg

The 7km 'red socks trail' complements Heslach's Blaustrümpflerweg. It runs from Marienplatz through Lehen to Wernhalde country park with its 40 sequoia trees. Along the way you can enjoy fantastic views from Santiago-de-Chile-Platz and Weissenburgpark.







On the subject of socks

According to legend, the people of Heslach betrayed Duke Ulrich as he was fleeing from his enemies in 1519. When he returned to Stuttgart, he condemned them to henceforth wear blue stockings. So to this day, they are known as 'Blaustrümpfler', i.e. those who wear blue stockings.

Wine & beer Southwards

Intoxicating

Stuttgart may be famed for its wine, but it's no stranger to hops and malt either. The southern part of the city is home to vineyards, but the air is also heavy with sweet aromas emanating from several breweries.



Quarter past beer

Quite early on, the southern edge of the city became the centre of Stuttgart's brewing industry. In 1888, Carl Dinkelacker set up his brewery on Tübinger Strasse and had deep cellars excavated in the cliffs at the foot of Karlshöhe hill for storing ice. There was plenty of water available for brewing, both underground and in springs on Hasenberg hill. The Stuttgarter Hofbräu brewery still boasts its own deep groundwater well on Böblinger Strasse.





After a guided tour of the Dinkelacker family brewery, stop off in the cosy bar of the brewery restaurant.





It's wine o'clock

Until the early 20th century, the southern slope of Hasenberg hill was covered by three large vineyards.

With the construction of many factories at the end of the 19th century, the winegrowers' village of Heslach became a working-class district with cheap, poorly-built residential quarters. A few impressive buildings, such as Marienhospital and St Matthew's Church ('Heslach Cathedral'), were intended to add a bit of grandeur.

You can still stroll through vineyards on the Schimmelhüttenweg trail (p. 8) or on Karlshöhe hill (p. 14), where the municipal winery is located.

Setting the scene Southwards

Rendezvous on Marienplatz

Marienplatz square is where southern Stuttgart comes into its own. From early morning until late at night, a hip crowd indulges in ice cream and all kinds of delicious food in the Kaiserbau building, the pavement cafés or simply on the steps. Sit yourself down, we'll make room.

LOCAL



Hip and trendy since 1911

The Kaiserbau building has towered over Marienplatz square since 1911. It gets its name from the Kaiser factory, which built vending machines and imported a trend from the US by opening a café with them. It was quite the sensation – you put in a coin and opened a door to help yourself to cake or rolls.

Circus, bunker, train station

Over the course of 140 years, Marienplatz has changed its face a few times. From the 1890s, there was a circus here whose tent could fit up to 3,500 spectators. In 1936, it became the terminus of the cog railway, complete with concrete ramp. The bunker beneath the square, built during World War Two, is now used as a rehearsal room.

Hit the heights on Karlshöhe



Between the south and the west lies enchanted Karlshöhe hill with its vines and gardens. Thanks to its panorama terrace, beer garden and playground, the former quarry is one of the area's most popular spots.



Great prospects The beer garden

Having reached the summit, it's time to refuel at Tschechen & Söhne. The beer garden replaced a milk bar that was opened for the 1961 German National Garden Show. From its terrace, you can see the vines of the municipal vineyard and a picture-postcard view of Stuttgart.



Stuttgart has 600 'stäffele' – the Swabian word for flights of steps – that help people tackle the steep slopes of the hills that surround its centre. Karlshöhe takes this to energetic new heights, as the 408 steps of its Willy-Reichert-Staffel make this the city's longest flight.





Romantic The lapidarium

The lapidarium is home to 200 stone sculptures, scattered between the roses and oleander. Established in 1905 as a private Renaissance garden, from 1950 onwards the city began to deposit fragments from the war-damaged city here. The open-air museum contains 500 years' worth of historical monuments.



Don't quarry, be happy!

The top of Karlshöhe hill was first quarried in the 14th century. Sandstone from here was used to build Stuttgart's Collegiate Church and Old Castle, for example. Today, the quarry's crater has been turned into a playground.

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Make a date with the city Southwards



A colourful spectacle

... awaits in July at the Africa Festival on Erwin-Schoettle-Platz. As the bells of St Matthew's Church mingle with the sound of exotic rhythms, African culture is celebrated with dance, readings, fashion shows and a big market.

In the right place at the right time

Get together

... any time on Marienplatz, for example at the WOUAHOU Winter Village, the Marienplatz festival or at the weekly organic market. This square is the vibrant heart of Stuttgart's south.



Spot(light) on: Tübinger Strasse

Beautiful cafés, trendy bars: easygoing Tübinger Strasse is the ideal place to stroll and mingle or sit and drink. There are plenty of great places to stop off along the way. Below are three popular venues.

SATTLEREI

Bare, unplastered walls in rambling groundfloor premises. Trendy Sattlerei (saddlery) gets its name – as well as all its beers and a strong aroma of hops – from its neighbour, the Dinkelacker brewery. This is where the harnesses for the brewery horses used to be stored.

... riding your bike on the Woodpecker trail

The adrenaline surges as mountain bikers race downhill. This track in Dornhaldenwald forest features 27 obstacles and an altitude variation of 120 metres. But one ride is never enough! Luckily, the cog railway offers a quick and easy way to get back to the top.



... tackling the steps on the Stäffeles-Tour Süd

Stuttgart's steps – known as 'stäffele' – are legendary. They take you to the heart of the quarters, with an added workout for your calf muscles. For example, on the Stäffeles-Tour Süd, up Karlshöhe hill and down the Panoramastaffeln. Along the way, you can enjoy fabulous views across the south and west of the city.



Local (hi)stories Gerberviertel quarter

Undercover

The small Gerberviertel quarter connects the city centre with the south. Its quiet seclusion hides some surprising stories. Once upon a time, there was ...







... a foul stench.


Things used to be quite idyllic beyond the city walls until the authorities banished all trades associated with uncleanliness and foul smells in 1806. From then on, tanners and those working with fire were only allowed to settle here. Now, just the name and one last tannery remain as reminders of the quarter's origin.

... a stream that went underground.

The tanners set up shop along the Nesenbach stream. So what happened to it? It flows from Vaihingen to Heslach, where it disappears. Along the way, it becomes a sewer. Its name is remembered in Nesenbachstrasse, where it makes a brief reappearance.

Bye-bye mainstream

From cowboy boots to queer literature, a kaleidoscope of independent shops thrive in the Gerberviertel quarter. Tübinger Strasse is the go-to place for vintage fashion. Let the treasure hunt begin!



First choice for second hand – Tübinger Strasse

Tübinger Strasse is lined with shops that will delight lovers of vintage goods. A true paradise for treasure seekers and bargain hunters.

Unique shops in the Gerberviertel quarter

Erlkoenig is one of the few remaining queer bookshops in the German-speaking world. It has been offering literature on a diverse range of topics and characters for over 40 years.

Since 1999, the Flaming Star has added pizazz and above all rock'n'roll to the city – with petticoats, flat caps, and 1950s and 60s fashion.

Helga Brehme brings marionettes and shadow puppets to life at Theater am Faden, where she performs classic plays and fairytales from around the world on a miniature stage. She was awarded the Federal Cross of Merit in 2022.





Festival feeling

The Delphi dates back to 1912. The city's oldest cinema hosts festivals such as CineLatino and the German-Turkish film festival SiNEMA. The Jour Fixe du Cinéma Français features films in their original French version.

Bold new drama

Since 2004, JES (Junges Ensemble Stuttgart) has staged productions dealing with issues that affect young people. Participation is positively encouraged at the Kulturareal Unterm Turm theatre. Say yes to JES!




Drama, baby, drama!

An art nouveau gem

The Altes Schauspielhaus theatre is an art nouveau building nestled into Kleine Königstrasse. From 1909 onwards, locals were able to enjoy plays here that were banned by the censor in Berlin, all thanks to Württemberg's liberal king, Wilhelm II.

Off the rails


From writer-led theatre to offbeat performances, expect the unexpected. At 9pm, Thtr Rmpe welcomes a regular visitor as the cog railway tootles into the foyer of the old station building for its overnight rest.

With strings attached, for young people or on a small stage: the best of regional theatre.



Parliament & theatre

ABV-Zimmertheater was founded in 1921 by the drama department of the Workers' Educational Association. Its home is Eduard Pfeiffer Haus, although it had to temporarily make way for the state parliament after World War Two.



Things are a bit more modern at FITZ, especially in the programme for adults. Creative ensembles perform with puppets that are not averse to acting up.





Big fun on a small stage

An illuminated sign in the dark above a narrow door points the way to 3-Groschentheater, Stuttgart's smallest theatre. It has been attracting amateur actors and drama students since 1975.



The must-sees

The elegant quarters of Heusteigviertel and Lehen drape themselves along the south-facing slopes, their 1870s architecture a feast for the eyes. At their heart is the art nouveau Church of St Mark.



Grand Gründerzeit, alluring art nouveau

The streets of Heusteigviertel are ideal for exploring at a leisurely pace. Here you'll find architecture from the Gründerzeit period of the 1870s, and fine examples of art nouveau and neoclassicism. Lehen also boasts some beautiful old buildings, particularly on Cottastrasse and Liststrasse. Options for a break abound along the way, for example at Herbert'z Espressobar and Café List.





A real wow factor The Church of St Mark

Completed in 1908, the Church of St Mark is one of only a few art nouveau churches in Germany and one of the first made of reinforced concrete. Inside, its colourful glass doors, ornate bannisters and gold and turquoise lights add a touch of magic. The church is a popular venue for concerts due to the organ's orientation towards the congregation.

Of hay and wood

'Heu', or hay, is not the origin of Heusteigviertel's name. Rather, it's due to the wood that was cut in the forests along the foot of Bopser hill. 'In die Heue steigen', or 'going up to the place where wood is cut', gives us Heusteig. And 'viertel' is quarter, of course.

Herbert'z The local hub

The supersize coffee machine in this espresso bar gives weary brains a boost throughout the day. Local night owls are also well-served by this bar, sometimes even with live music.

A draw for all ages - Kochenbas

Everyone from students to pensioners flock here for the *rostbraten* beef. The former Zum Immenhofer tavern was bought by the winegrowing Koch family and run by their 'bas', or cousin, Pauline Koch. That gave rise to the name we see today: Kochenbas.

Unofficially important Mozartplätzle

Officially, Mozartplätzle on the corner of Mozartstrasse and Immenhofer Strasse doesn't exist. Mozartplatz square at the other end of Mozartstrasse does. Yet it's Mozartplätzle that's the heart of the neighbourhood, not the square. When the Heusteigviertel festival is on, the area is thronged with people, both at Mozartplätzle and the square.



A local institution in Lehen

People have been enjoying a large glass of wine at the Gasthaus am Eck since 1904. In the 21st century, the locals still treat this as their home-from-home. Everyone is welcome, whatever their background or interests, as Lehen is big on sharing time together.




