Fun and festivities on the market square

Whether it's the Stuttgart Wine Festival, the Summer Festival of Cultures, the weekly market or the Christmas market, there is always something going on outside the town hall. Whatever the season, Stuttgart's market square is the beating heart of the city.



DOQU Shopping in style

With its state-of-the-art architecture, luxury brands and high-end restaurants, the Dorotheen Quarter – or DOQU – certainly brings glitz and glamour to the city centre. If you are shopping for luxury items, you will find plenty to tempt you on the boulevard between the Markthalle and the Breuninger department store.



Markthalle artisan food market

Oil from Italy, honey from Turkey: the Markthalle is a cornucopia of delights. The art nouveau building dating from 1914 is home to a fish market and more than 30 stalls selling delicacies from around the world.

Geissstrasse has its very own buzz. People flock here in the evenings to meet for a beer or a bite to eat. In the summer, the party atmosphere spills into the streets, where everyone enjoys the old-town charm around the fountain.

The Stuttgardia

The Stuttgardia watches over the city from the side of the town hall. This bronze sculpture stands at 2.41m tall and was modelled on the young Else Weil. The daughter of a Jewish doctor was forced to flee to the USA during the Nazi regime.

These days, you don't often see paternoster lifts in Germany, which is why the locals are particularly fond of the one in the town hall foyer. Slowly but surely, it does its rounds on a continuous loop, travelling no more than 0.3m per second.



The bunker hotel

Believe it or not, there is a giant bunker five metres beneath the market square. Although it was originally designed for 1,010 people, it provided temporary shelter to as many as 3,000 during the Second World War. From 1945 to 1985, it served as a hotel – the Hotel am Rathaus, and later the Hotel am Marktplatz – and was one of the largest in the city. The bunker opens every year on Museums Night.

Open day and night for 25 years, the Vegi was one of Stuttgart's first vegetarian and vegan snack bars and is now firmly established on the city's culinary scene. Here you can tuck into falafel in pitta bread with mouthwatering sauces and toppings.

Food, glorious food The Markthalle in Stuttgart is a

The Markthalle in Stuttgart is a showcase for fine food. The art nouveau building is one of the city's loveliest attractions. There is plenty to tempt you inside, with stalls selling international and regional food in an area spanning 3,500m².



It is Stuttgart's light-flooded gourmet paradise. When the Markthalle opened in 1914, its arcades, bay windows and art nouveau flourishes blended in seamlessly with the surrounding buildings. Its interior, however, was considered radical by the standards of the day. Exposed reinforced steel beams spanned the contemporary hall, and two glass ceilings arched above the 400+ stalls below.

Today, it is home to over 30 stalls selling delicacies from all over the world, including exotic fruit, spices, bread, pastries and cakes. The fish market offers fresh fish and seafood daily.

A spot of shopping

The Markthalle is also home to Merz & Benzing, an exquisite department store selling furniture, cooking utensils, flowers and stylish home accessories over three floors.

Sitting pretty

Ceres, the Roman goddess of agriculture, sits in her niche above the fountain at the edge of the hall. A perfect photo opportunity!

Style and substance

No room for understatement. The Dorotheen Quarter – DOQU for short – is all about elegance and style.

The wrinkles of the city

Built from limestone, aluminium and glass, the three new buildings in this part of the city create a striking contrast. The fascinating roof landscape is also a masterstroke of design. The steel and glass construction features creases, folds, slants and printed glazing.

Bird's eye view

The buildings, some of which are nine storeys high, blend skillfully into the urban landscape and afford unimpeded views of historical sights such as the collegiate church, Altes Schloss and town hall.

Shopping in style

Sheer luxury: DOQU is home to exclusive brands such as Rolex and Steiff, plus the first interactive Porsche Brand Store. Fans of trainers will be in their element at the Suppa store, which not only offers footwear but fashion from head to toe.

Stylish new ventures behind the town hall



The wind of change is blowing on Pierre-Pflimlin-Platz. The opening of a boutique hotel and three stylish eateries has given this neighbourhood a new impetus.

Sleep easy at the EmiLu Hotel

Since opening in 2021, the EmiLu Hotel has breathed new life into a former administrative building from the 1960s behind the town hall. The bedrooms stand out for their original design and quality furnishings.

The trio cooking up a storm

Fritz, Gian Paolo e Marco and Tatti have created outdoor eating areas on the square where people can see and be seen. In fact, 'stay & see' is the tagline at Tatti, where you can grab a pastrami sandwich and Peroni. Fritz takes brunch to a whole new level. And at Gian Paolo e Marco, you can sip extravagant drinks against a backdrop of marble and pink tiles. The latter two are based at the EmiLu Hotel.

Shopping never goes out of fashion

The people of Stuttgart have been coming to the speciality stores and traditional retailers on the market square for generations. Tritschler, Breuninger and Korbmayer are stalwarts of the city's retail scene and Stuttgart wouldn't be the same without them.



Tritschler

If you are on the lookout for stylish tableware and kitchen accessories, Tritschler is the place for you. The store on the market square stocks glass, porcelain, gifts and household items. The city's oldest retailer has been up and running since 1723. Quite literally, in fact. Back then, the glassware was transported on foot from the Black Forest to Stuttgart's weekly markets.

There are few other cities where the locals are as loyal to a coffee brand as Stuttgart. Funnily enough, it was a man from Braunschweig and a woman from Hamburg who founded the first Hochland coffee roastery on Königstrasse in 1930. Coffee lovers should definitely make a beeline for the Hochland coffee roasteries and Holanka Bars, which offer tea and coffee specialities, truffles, sweet ravioli and more.

DÌD YOU KNOW ...

87 dilapidated buildings around Geissstrasse, some of which were medieval, were knocked down and replaced by 36 new buildings between 1906 and 1909. The new 'old quarter' featured gabled houses, bay windows and arcades, with the Lucky Hans fountain providing the finishing touch. If you look closely, you can spot other fairytale characters on the building facades, such as Hansel and Gretel, Till Eulenspiegel and Stuttgart's Hutzelmännlein.

KOTTAN

Relax and unwind, play a game of backgammon, swing your hips and enjoy the coffee-house culture at Kottan, where you can tuck into a delicious cold platter.

Weekly highlights

Five times a day

... a carillon at the town hall – 11.05am, 12.05pm, 2.35pm, 6.35pm and 9:35pm. The people of Stuttgart heard the carillon chime for the first time in 1925, but back then in the old town hall.

→ Tip: take a guided tour of the tower, and see the city centre from new heights! Bookings at the town hall.

Three times a week

... a market on Marktplatz! On Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings, the aroma of basil and parsley fills the air as people mill around the stalls buying fresh local produce.

 \rightarrow Tip: During the week, the panoramic window on the fourth floor of the town hall is the best vantage point for watching the market's comings and goings.

Annual highlights



In the summer

... the Summer Festival of Cultures takes place outside the town hall. The crowds saunter around the market of cultures, sampling curry, flatbread and other specialities, while bands showcase the very best in world music.

In late summer

... the Stuttgart Wine Festival creates a fantastic atmosphere on the streets between Marktplatz and Schillerplatz. For twelve days, everyone congregates under 120 vine-clad arbours to celebrate the finest produce from the region's vineyards.



In the winter

... the Christmas market in the city centre enchants visitors with its 300 festively decorated stalls. With 300 years under its belt, it is not only one of the oldest and largest Christmas markets in Europe, but also one of the most beautiful.



The must-sees

Wine taverns in the evening, speakeasies by night. Classical music at the Gustav Siegle Haus, jazz sounds at the Kiste. Home of the bean king, home of the drag queens. Red-light mood, late-night food.



The high life on Wilhelmsplatz

You will find one restaurant after another on Wilhelmsplatz. It attracts the in-crowd and old timers, sipping their drinks and ordering pizza or noodle soup. The terrace is a prime spot for people-watching!

Party zone in the village

Small-town charm meets city life, as the cobbled streets give way to the small red-light district. The Bohnenviertel and Leonhardsviertel districts have always carved out their own path through history, attracting an eclectic mix of late-night party-goers, musical stars and creative types.

Pretty as a picture

The shops and picturesque narrow streets and courtyards of the Bohnenviertel feel far removed from the hubbub of the city. The buildings on Weberstrasse, Wagnerstrasse, Brennerstrasse and Rosenstrasse are a sight to behold with their baroque, art nouveau and neo-Renaissance facades.





LOCAL FACTS

Let there be light!

A fountain behind St Leonard's Church is a reminder of an age-old profession. The statue of a night watchman stands above it with a lantern, halberd and dog. This lantern was the first electric light source on the streets of Stuttgart.

Charity from the heart (of the city)

When St Leonhard's Church was built in 1466, it stood outside the city walls. Today, it is right in the middle of the city. It was the first 'Vesperkirche' to be founded in Germany, helping up to 1,000 people in need every day by providing food, advice, medical care and human warmth.



Long live the bean king!

The suburb of St Leonard developed as the first extension of the medieval city centre in the 14th century. It provided homes for winegrowers and craftsmen, whose fireplaces posed a risk in the centre. The hungry locals cultivated vegetables in the courtyards and along the walls – especially bean plants, which gave the quarter its name. For Epiphany, a cake was baked with a bean hidden inside. Whoever found it was carried through the streets as the 'bean king' and allowed to 'hold court' at a feast.

Typical Bohnenviertel!

Cakes galore and late-night snacks, jazz clubs and a hospital for 'pawly' bears.



Bear essentials

Giuseppe Ricucci has been mending poorly teddy bears and dolls since 1995. Even the shop window is full of vintage dolls and collectibles.

All that jazz: the Bix and the Kiste

For mellow jazz sounds, head to the Bix Club. This popular venue in the annex of Gustav Siegle Haus hosts 250 concerts a year and has brought a fresh energy to the jazz scene. A block away is the iconic Kiste, an intimate venue that has been showcasing the very best in jazz since 1988.

Wine bars from A to Z

Wine taverns have a long tradition in the Bohnenviertel. They hark back to the rustic inns belonging to the winegrowers, whose vineyards once started directly behind Weberstrasse. Today, they still offer the same cosy atmosphere and good food, and are the 'local' for many.



Time-honoured

Patrons may have to climb to the third floor to get to their table, but it's worth making the effort to drink and dine at this tavern that served as a restaurant back in the day of King Charles of Württemberg.



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
