The must-sees

An avenue for strolling, a square for mingling. Shops for spending, a thoroughfare for thinking. A modest palace, two supersized castles. Five floors of books, four huts for pretzels. An old granary full of music, a glass cube full of art.



On the move Königstrasse

Stuttgart's longest shopping street – 1.2 kilometres of department stores, boutiques and more – cuts straight through the city centre. You can stroll in the shade of Königstrasse's plane trees right into the heart of the city, where Schlossplatz awaits.

Like no other Schlossplatz square

As every Swabian child knows, *the* Schlossplatz can be found in Stuttgart. Surrounded by milestones from the city's history, this square is the place to go for la dolce vita. It is the venue for major events such as the Jazz Open and the Stuttgart International Festival of Animated Film.





Atmospheric Schillerplatz square

Legend has it that Stuttgart's roots – the 'Stutengarten' – lie here. The square is at its most beautiful on market days, when Germany's first statue of the poet Schiller looks down on the hustle and bustle below. You can spot the two towers of the collegiate church behind the gables of the Old Granary. The duke's bookkeepers once sat in the Old Chancellery opposite, but now you can enjoy a coffee here and the views of the Old Palace. The real deal!

Brezelkörble huts

If the little ones are whining in their buggies, exhausted parents on Königstrasse should head to a Brezelkörble hut for a pit stop. It was in New York that innovative baker Ursula Zotz-Füess got the idea to sell her wares on the street. She started selling her pretzels from a pram with a parasol back in 1969. The Brezelkörble, literally 'pretzel baskets', were a big hit, and two years later the cute little huts were built.

Team Crêpes

This hut by the entrance to Arnulf-Klett-Passage has been selling crêpes since 1980. Locals queue here as they decide between sweet or savoury pancakes, but the hut is also a popular place to meet friends before going for a walk in the city centre. There are two more places where the locals like to meet up: at the entrance to Wittwer book store and in front of the ornate ironwork of the music pavilion on Schlossplatz square.

At your convenience

This pavilion has assumed many guises over the years, starting life as a public toilet in 1926. When the Wittwer book store opened a kiosk here, its slogan was 'books upstairs, toilets below'. The Palast der Republik pub that now calls the pavilion home is hugely popular. On a summer's evening, crowds flock here to drink, chat and sit together late into the night.

The grand exteriors on Schlossplatz square line up like pearls on a string. A spectacle best enjoyed at the foot of the Jubilee Column.


Book store

Stores galore

Shopping in Stuttgart also means Königstrasse. And at its heart, the Königsbau building houses a modern shopping paradise. The flower market and flea market on Schillerplatz and Karlsplatz are also bustling.



Browse and buy, dive in and escape

A veritable sea of blooms washes over Schillerplatz three times a week. Follow your nose across the flower market from the Old Castle to the Prinzenbau building. Shopping in the Königsbau – by royal appointment

Behind the colonnades facing Schlossplatz lies a shopper's paradise. Built in the 19th century as a shopping arcade and concert hall, the Königsbau received a modern extension in 2005. The glass roof at the back now covers the Königsbau Passagen, home to a variety of shops and former suppliers to the royal court, including the Berthold & Schwerdtner music shop and Lederwaren Acker for leather goods.

Last-minute gift ideas on Königstrasse

Postcards from Roller Buch & Presse

This quirky corner shop in Königsbau sells international newspapers, souvenirs, books, a selection of postcards and second-hand treasures.

The state library's new award-winning building boasts a folded roof and wonderful views, and you can spend hours exploring its light-flooded interior.

Insider tip A musical high in Stuttgart


Take the lift to the 11th floor, then climb a couple of stairs and you're there! The tower of Stuttgart's State University of Music and the Performing Arts is 50 metres high. Its roof terrace has glazed sections that allow you to look down on the city as snippets of music fill the air.

Back to the future House of History, Baden-Württemberg

Baden-Württemberg's House of History uses a 'theme park', a walk-on map and oversized suitcases to explore the history of, and stories from, south-west Germany from 1790 to the present day.

A cultural kaleidoscope Stuttgart State Gallery

Treasures from the Middle Ages to the present, including by Picasso, make the State Gallery a real must-see. Its architecture is no less eye-catching, with a cascade of terraces and staircases offering a real sense of dynamism.






Does Stuttgart do culture? Of course it does! Dance and theatre, art and music, history and storytelling. The cultural mile offers it all, including inspiration.

Treasure hunt Württemberg State Museum

Over the centuries, the Old Castle has been a medieval moated castle and a royal residence. Today, it is home to the Württemberg State Museum, which spans many eras from its Renaissance arches in the courtyard to the modern lounge in the former knights' hall.



There's so much to see in the museum in addition to the contemporary art and the amazing Otto Dix collection. This cuboid building also offers glorious views of Schlossplatz. If you're not in love with Stuttgart already, the wall-towall windows of the CUBE restaurant will leave you completely smitten.







Jump for joy at Eckensee lake Stuttgart State Theatres

Stuttgart State Opera, the world's largest triple-genre theatre, has been voted Opera House of the Year six times. Elsewhere, a focus on an international programme and dialogue are key features of the Stuttgart Playhouse. And the Stuttgart Ballet found global success under director John Cranko.

In the right place



Lunch at the museum On Wednesdays between 12.30pm and 1pm,

you can enjoy a lunchtime treat at the Art Museum. A 30 minute guided tour provides a small slice of art, and you can stay for lunch afterwards.

Music to your ears Every Tuesday and Thursday at 8.45am,

the sound of four trumpeters rises above the city centre. Started in 1618, this more than 400 year-old custom sees the musicians climb the west tower of the collegiate church twice a week, high above the hubbub of the weekly market below.

The must-sees

A historical row of houses, a glamorous centrepiece and 11,000 plants. Experience the charm and hospitality of Calwer Strasse and Calwer Passage in the city centre.



Side by side

From Biedermeier and late baroque to neo-Renaissance and art nouveau, nowhere else in the city centre will you find so many houses from different periods sitting side by side as in Calwer Strasse.

Green goddess

Welcome to the jungle! The walls of the new Calwer Passage building on Rotebühlplatz square are covered in evergreen perennials, winter jasmine and other plants, while a miniature mixed forest on the roof reaches for the sky. This pioneering project benefits the urban climate and has garnered international attention.





Homage to Milan

Plants on the outside, shops on the inside: this prime example of urban greening on Rotebühlplatz hides an elegant, heritage-listed centrepiece. When it opened in 1979, Calwer Passage was considered a homage to the Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II in Milan thanks to its glass roof, marble floor and gold detailing. This ambience is no less tangible in the 21st century. It had a facelift in 2022, and now people once again flock here for the independent shops and creative eateries.

An instant hit!

Udo is irreplaceable when it comes to a snack. And it's hard to imagine the city centre without Feinkost Böhm.



Long live the king of snacks!

Udo-Snack has been serving currywurst sausages and burgers to hungry patrons for over 60 years. Udo Höroldt opened his business in Bolzstrasse in 1962, and just two years later Udo-Snack – complete with concert posters and local ambience – opened in Calwer Strasse.

An evening out in wonderful surroundings

Cafés, restaurants, taverns and champagne bars are lined up along the historical buildings of Calwer Strasse. This is the place where people come to meet. On summer evenings, the pedestrian zone becomes one great party, a heady afterwork cocktail of laughter, clinking glasses and the aroma of food.



The joy of sekt

Kessler is the region's traditional sekt sparkling wine. Founded in 1826, Germany's oldest sekt producer from neighbouring Esslingen has opened a well-stocked shop and a bar in Stuttgart.

A visit to Europaviertel

Swabians are known for their hard work and housebuilding, and the Europaviertel next to the developing new train station is a prime example. On Mailänder Platz, the world of shopping in the Milaneo mall meets the realm of knowledge at the stunning municipal library.

Living the high life

Stuttgart's newest city centre district has risen from what was once the central goods and marshalling yard next to the main train station. Modern apartment buildings, banks, hotels and a shopping mall can be found all over Europaviertel, and the trend is upwards. Buildings such as the LBBW City-Tower and Cloud N°7 are leading the way. Here, the Wolfram rooftop bar on the sixth floor of Hotel Jaz in the City offers views of the municipal library, the sunset and the hills surrounding Stuttgart.

Knowledge and beauty in a box


Time magazine named Stuttgart's municipal library one of the 20 most beautiful in the world. This cuboid wonder was designed by Korean architect Eun Young Yi.

A roof with a view


Panoramic views of the city centre and the Europaviertel quarter await on the roof terrace. As night falls, the blue illuminations transform the building into a monumental light sculpture.
